CRJ 550: Graduate Seminar. An exploration of psychology and the law covering the latest research trends in expert testimony, jury selection and decision making, restoration of competency to stand trial, violence risk assessment, suspect interviews and false confessions, lie detection, eyewitness identification, misinformation research, interviewing cooperative witnesses, offender “profiling equations,” and trial judging.

CRJ 596: Selected Topics: The Death Penalty. Integrating into my teaching my sabbatical as a volunteer death-penalty defense attorney, the course will focus on the structure of capital punishment jurisprudence and constitutional challenges to the death penalty. We will examine the issues of race, gender, sexual orientation, age, class, and mental states in the imposition of the death penalty with special emphasis on cruel and unusual punishment, due process, and equal protection.

Undergraduate:

UNIV 101: The Semiotics of Monster Making. A first-year seminar celebrating the 200th anniversary of Mary Shelley’s 1818 publication of Frankenstein with an examination of the sign-making of “monsters” in society through demonizing “the other” in politics, criminal justice, sociology, psychology and popular culture.

CRJ 370: Mock Trial. A course that teaches how to conduct all aspects of a criminal trial from jury selection through sentencing with the students performing as advocates for the prosecution or defense. All exercises except the last trial are performed without notes to force students to think on their feet.

CRJ 390: Selected Topics: Advanced Criminal Procedure. A seminar course on the Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Amendments and the role of the criminal justice professional.

CRJ 390: Summer Selected Topics: Psychology and the Law. A course that requires the student to master psychology concepts as applied to the law (face-to-face and online).

HON 392: Honors Seminar: The History of Law in Black and White. An interdisciplinary course that examines the legal basis and justification for slavery, integration, and affirmative action with original source research of Freedmen's Bureau documents at the National Archives. Students act as attorneys in the mock trials of William Styron's Nat Turner and Barbara Grutter (unsuccessful University of Michigan Law School affirmative-action litigant).

CRJ 396: Selected Topics: Public Perception of Criminal Justice. A course on how the O.J. Simpson trial, the Watergate scandal, the federal actions against citizens at Ruby Ridge, Idaho and Waco, Texas, the internal operations of the U.S. Supreme Court and political influence on criminal justice funding all effect how the public perceives criminal justice professionals.

CRJ 431: Law and Society. The examination of the intersection of law and its role in everyday life, from buying a box of cereal to crimes against morality. Students are asked to watch or listen to excerpts from music, art, and popular culture media to relate society's perspective to the legal rules and regulations under review.

CRJ 433: Evidence Law. A rigorous examination of the Federal Rules of Evidence and the case law that defines how courts interpret the Rules (face-to-face and online).
